### **Our Animal World**



### Year 2 Trip to the Beach

The children loved their trip to the beach to celebrate the end of their time in Year 2. They had a picnic on the beach, created artwork inspired by Andy Goldsworthy and recapped their human and physical features learning from Geography. Thank you to all of the volunteers who helped us on a very hot, but windy day!







### **Outdoor Learning**

As the weather has been sunnier, we have been enjoying as many opportunities as we can for outdoor learning. We have embraced the heavy rain too! We celebrated outdoor classroom day, spent time in Colneis wildlife area and have had extra sessions with Mrs Churchyard at Fairfield exploring our green spaces here. The children love being outside and taking their learning out of the classroom. They are really looking forward to their outdoor sessions in Year 3.













I cannot believe that we have reached the end of the school year already. We are so pleased with the children's transition from Year 2 to Year 3. The Open Evening was a great opportunity to see how much progress they have made across the year and we hope you enjoyed looking through their work. This half term, we have continued our Rainforest topic. In English, we have written persuasive letters to stop deforestation. In Maths, we have learnt about fractions, time and shape. The children have also had fantastic opportunities to take part in sports events competing against other schools, sports day and a tennis taster session. We also got to enjoy the Outdoor Learning Day, the Year 6 performance and a Happiness Festival. Thank you for all of your support and we hope you have a great, safe summer.

### Rainforest Project





We were very impressed with the children's rainforest homework. There were a variety of creative ideas and the children got to share their projects in our assembly. They explained what they had created and how they achieved it. The children received 10 house points for their efforts.









#### **Fabulous Artwork**

This term, the children have been creating 3D masks. They have based their designs on rainforest animals. They created a hardened oval shape using gum tape and used paint and materials to embellish them.



### We are all Scientists!



This term Year 4 have been learning about different states of matter in Science and how a liquid can turn into a gas and a solid.

As part of our learning, the children carried out an experiment to see

what happens to water over time. The children wet dishcloths and chose different locations in the playground to hang their washing. 4LA hung their wet cloth on a washing line near the benches, 4MS placed their cloth on the back fence and 4W put theirs on the side fence.

To ensure it was a fair test, the children checked that there was an equal amount of water on each cloth and then recorded its weight at the start of the experiment. The children then made observations of their cloths to see how much it had dried over the afternoon. The cloths were then weighed again to see how the water content had altered, with many of the children starting to understand that the water was evaporating in the sunny conditions of a windy day. By the end of the afternoon, all the dishcloths had dried and the children drew their conclusions that the best places for drying were on the back fence where there was lots of sunshine and plenty of wind.

# Times Tables Superstars!

In the early parts of this summer term, the children worked incredibly hard learning their times tables, ready for the Year 4 Multiplication Check. We were extremely proud of the effort they put into the task and their determination to learn them all off by heart.

Well done Year 4 — You rock!




### John Brunsdon Landscapes

This term, to link with our Food and Farming topic, we have been focusing on the work of John



Brunsdon. We sketched some landscapes in his style using techniques such as shading and outlining to create a layered effect and varying perspective.





We were equally impressed by all the children's hard work on their Food and Farming projects—finding out about everything from chickens and cows, to crops and tractors. They did amazing research and presented their work beautifully—with some amazing artwork and even a Power Point presentation.

### **African Drumming: The Wooden Roots Experience**

To enhance our Music curriculum, the Year 5 children were treated to an African Drumming workshop, led by 'Wooden Roots'. There was an initial introduction to West African geography, culture and language. Following this, each child was taught how to use a Djembe drum and how to manipulate the pitch of the drum by changing their hand and finger positioning. The children learnt a range of different beats and rhythms, and developed their skills in order to be able to perform as a group.



### **Geography Field Trip**

As part of our Geography topic this term on 'Towns and Settlements', we have been focusing on the difference between human and physical geographical features. Our field trip in June took us on a walk from school, through the town centre and down to the beach. We carried out a traffic survey, with a focus on electric vehicles and the potential future positive impact to our environment. We also discussed transport, tourism and leisure activities, learning about the rise of Felixstowe as a tourist destination in the Victorian era.







#### Year 2 and Year 5 Buddies

The Year 5 children were incredibly excited to finally meet their Year 2 buddies. Having made initial contact by writing to each other, they finally met on the whole school transition day. After eating lunch together on the field, a variety of activities were arranged, including an outdoor learning wildlife hunt in the Colneis wildlife area. We will look forward to meeting up again in September as the new Year 3 and Year 6.











Year 6 have had another busy half term; they have been preparing for their production, enjoyed learning outside, and even been on a couple of trips.

#### Year 6 Production—Aladdin Trouble

The children auditioned, were selected and learnt lines and songs in preparation for their end of year 6 production. We have been very impressed with their acting skills and we're sure you felt as proud as we did as you saw them perform on stage.









### Duxford DT—Cushions

On 19th June, the children were delighted to visit Duxford. They were especially excited to travel on a double decker bus! Whilst we were there, we saw Spitfires carrying out an air show, explored different hangers (full of a variety of planes including a Concorde), tried on uniforms and even managed to eat an ice cream. This visit really brought their learning to life.

On 'Outdoor Education Day', the children took part in a variety of activities including willow weaving, following the willow trail and sketching flowers. They have also been able to go into the wildlife area to pond dip (they couldn't believe how much wildlife has moved in during the past year) and last week, they had an opportunity to weave their own fish.







#### **U11 Futsal**

A fantastic afternoon of Futsal. Both of our teams played beautifully. The B team, who were playing in a development league, worked hard against all of their opponents and managed to improve with every performance. They really stood out for their teamwork and effort.

The A team worked equally as hard, finishing as runners up in their group and qualifying for the semi finals. A close 1 - 0 win in the semi final put them through to the final against Dale Hall. It was a very close game, eventually losing 2-0 but earning themselves a thoroughly deserved place in the County finals!





### **U7 Dodgeball**

A brilliant couple of teams went off to Dodgeball at the start of the term.

They competed so well and really grew into the competition, improving with every game. One of our teams managed to get through to the semi finals but all of the children deserve a big thank you for representing our school so beautifully!

3 unwaxed lemons roughly chopped

140gms caster sugar

### STEP 1

### How to make a Dragon Puppet by Ellie



Want to get crafty over the summer holidays? Try making one of Ellie's amazing dragon puppets. Here are her simple step-by-step instructions.

- 1. Grab a piece of paper and roll it up.
- 2. Pat it down and tape it so it's like a flat sausage.
- 3. Fold it into a horseshoe shape and press it down again, so it looks like a flat pointed 'v' shape.
- 4. Repeat the process, so you have two 'v' shapes.
- 5. Open out the 'v' shape and place on a piece of paper and trace the triangular shape. Repeat again.
- 6. Cut out both of the triangles and decorate with your dragon face.
  One triangle becomes the head, eyes and upper jaw. The other triangle becomes the lower jaw.
- 7. Customise your design—adding on any extra parts (scales etc) that will make your design come alive.
- 8. Stick the upper dragon's face to one of the sideways 'v' shapes and the lower dragon's face to the other sideways 'v' shape.
- 9. Tape both parts of the dragon's face together to form your puppet.
- 10. Place your fingers in the top 'V' and your thumb in the bottom 'v' and start the puppet show!

- Firstly, find 4 small, smooth pebbles on the beach and wash them until they are completely clean.
- 2) Pat with a towel or tissue to dry.
- Whilst they are drying, prepare your plant pot, by filling it with small stones.
- 4) Fill the pot up with stones, but leave spaces for the cactus rocks.
- 5) When the pebbles are fully dry, cover them completely in green paint.
- 6) When the painted pebbles are dry, add the spikes with pen, and any other decorations such as flowers made from paper or modelling clay. Secure with glue.












Slice with pizza cutter and enjoy
